Student Schedule



8:00 a.m. Arrival, ID Photos and Check-In

Come on in, enjoy some coffee and a continental breakfast before the day ahead. Once you're ready, a ROAR Leader will guide you to the joint welcome address for students and families. Did you arrive early enough to take your photo for your student ID? If so, your ROAR Leader will show you where to go so that you can beat the lines later. Make sure you let them know if you're planning to live on campus so they direct you to the correct location.

9:00 a.m. Welcome and Introductions

ROAR (Resources, Orientation, Advising and Registration) has started! Meet the ROAR Leaders and Interns, and get information about the exciting day ahead.

9:30 a.m. Small Group Meetings with ROAR Leaders


2:15 p.m. Creating GSU Traditions: How to make your mark in a changing culture!






