Governors State University offers a full-time, day-time distinct undergraduate experience in the Chicago Southland. Our freshman class is capped at 300 students to make sure every student receives the support needed to succeed throughout each academic year, including a free laptop. All freshman classes are taught by full-time faculty and capped at 30 students. And this small-class feel doesn't end after the freshman year—on average, GSU undergraduate classes have only 18 students. No teaching assistants. No packed auditoriums. That's the GSU experience.

STRUCTURED UNDERGRADUATE CURRICULUM

We take passion to heart. GSU's campus resources are dedicated to helping students find their purpose through intentional experiential and mentorship experiences. Advisors in the Undergraduate Academic Advising Center tailor each student's curriculum to fit their professional goals, while the Center for the Junior Year houses ten Peer Success Coaches who help students find their paths forward. The GSU Honors Program provides an enriched academic experience for students seeking a greater challenge through internships, conference participation, and opportunities to participate in Guided Pathways.

AIM HIGH SCHOLARSHIPS AND STUDENT SUCCESS PROGRAMS

GSU is offering more scholarships than ever before, both for freshmen and transfer students. Students who receive AIM HIGH funding are asked to participate in Student Success Programs, which include options such as Transformational Leadership, Male Success Initiative, and Career Compass Exploration.

Prairie Place provides convenient, cost-effective housing options for undergraduate and graduate students. SCHOLARSHIP OPPORTUNITIES

GSU offers a variety of institutional scholarships based on academic merit, personal achievement, or financial need. Presidential, Provost, and Dean's scholarships recur over eight consecutive fall and spring semesters for students who continue to qualify for honors program participation, and awards can be applied toward tuition, fees, housing, and books.

Ideal candidates for Presidential, Provost, and Dean's scholarships will meet the following criteria:

- 3.75 GPA unweighted on a 4.0 scale
- Complete application by November 1
- Complete Presidential Scholarship application by December 1
- Complete FAFSA in October

Presidential Scholarship:

(up to two awards each fall):

Full tuition, fees, housing, \$500 book stipend per semester, and \$1,000 meal plan per semester.

Provost's Scholarship:

\$2,500 award

Dean's Scholarship:

\$1.750 award

Merit Scholarships:

Students applying on or before February 1 may qualify for GSU merit scholarships. Awards vary based upon academic profile and available funds. Candidates directly admitted to the freshmen class with unweighted GPA between 2.75 and 3.75 considered for merit scholarships, as funds are available.

HONORS PROGRAM

The GSU Honors Program takes a distinct approach to the undergraduate experience. Emphasis is placed on developing personal, professional, and leadership potential through experiential learning opportunities such as internships, conference presentations, and study abroad. Students in the GSU Honors Program represent the university population as a whole.

DUAL DEGREE PROGRAM

In the Dual Degree Program, students enroll in full-time classes at one of 17 Chicagoland community colleges while working with a DDP Transfer Specialist to map out a pathway to two degrees. DDP students receive a multitude of benefits—among them, a locked-in tuition rate, full-tuition scholarship opportunities, and a more affordable education.

When students complete an associate degree, they are even more likely to obtain further education—our numbers prove it. Eighty-five percent of DDP students complete a bachelor's degree within four semesters of transferring to GSU.

- Transfer students from community colleges must have earned associates degrees to qualify for AIM HIGH grants.
- Transfer students with 24 or more transfer credits from any four-year institutions do not require earned associates degrees.
- Transfer students with 23 or less transfer credits from four-year institutions will be considered for First-Year AIM HIGH criteria and award amounts.

APPLICATION REQUIREMENTS

To apply today, complete an application online at www.govst.edu/apply. Your application will be complete once you provide the following:

FRESHMAN

- \$25 application fee
- Official high school transcript or GED score report
- 2.75 unweighted high school GPA on a 4.0 scale
- Submission of official ACT or SAT scores (students 21 or over exempt)
- Earned fewer than 25 semester hours of college credit to start at GSU as a freshmen
- Unconditional admission is offered to students earning both an unweighted 2.75+ GPA and 19 or above on the ACT (composite, math, and English scores or SAT equivalent)*

TRANSFER

- \$25 application fee
- Official transcripts from all previously attended institutions
- Supplemental items required for your selected degree program. Applicants must have earned 2.0 or higher GPA and 25 transferable college level credit hours. Applicants must also be in good standing at their last institution attended. Some programs have special admission requirements.

*Conditional admission is offered to freshman students earning an unweighted 2.25-2.74 GPA and/or 15-18 on the ACT (composite, math, and/or English scores or SAT equivalent).

Freshman with conditional admission requires participation in Smart Start, a two-week tuition free program beginning before the start of the fall semester (schedule revised for spring admission). All students are encouraged to participate in Smart Start. However, students offered conditional admission may show proficiency in math and/or English through university placement assessments to remove the conditional admission status.
