EDGAR COUNTY ROSC MEETING MINUTES

September 24, 2024 5:15 PM Paris Hospital Conference Room A and Zoom

Circle of Care Project

Ambrosia discussed the Circle of Care project, a statewide grant-funded initiative under the Illinois Family Resource Center. The project aims to build a network of support for children, youth, and families grieving loss due to substance use-related death and disorders. Ambrosia's team includes a project coordinator, a program planner, an administrative assistant, two trainers, a researcher, and an online resource toolkit developer. The project has four components: a grief support services directory, online resource toolkits, grief and substance use disorder-specific training and promotion of the Handle with Care initiative. Ambrosia also shared the results of a landscape analysis conducted by the researcher, highlighting the lack of licensed providers specializing in child and youth grief in the state. The team is currently conducting phase two of the research, focusing on non-clinical grief support services and resources. Ambrosia encouraged community members to share information about any grief support resources for children or teens in Edgar County.

Comprehensive Project and Training Initiatives

Ambrosia discussed the comprehensive nature of their project, which includes creating 21 online resource toolkits for various sectors, each tailored to the developmental age of the child. These toolkits aim to equip natural helpers with the tools to respond to children's grief and substance use issues. Ambrosia also mentioned the project's goal to complete these toolkits by the end of June. Furthermore, she introduced grief and substance use disorder-specific pieces of training, which will be provided free of charge and virtually. These trainings aim to educate attendees about substance use disorder, mental health, and family dynamics and will offer between 9 to 13 and a half CEUs. Ambrosia also mentioned that these trainings are open to anyone, regardless of their region, and are designed to foster interaction and resource sharing within communities.

Creating Comfort Bags for Kids

Ambrosia discussed the creation of 14,400 comfort bags for kids, which will be distributed during their threads of hope pieces of training and handle-with-care initiative training. The bags are

designed to provide comfort and support for children in various stressful or traumatic experiences, focusing on social and emotional learning. The bags will be divided into youth and teen bags, with English and Spanish versions. Ambrosia also mentioned the inclusion of items such as Mumble Balls, wooden hearts with activity markers, bookmarks with the 7 C's and teen help lines, and books and journals in the bags. The materials are expected to arrive by the end of October, and the bags will be assembled for distribution during trainings.

Handle With Care Initiative

Ambrosia discussed the Handle with Care initiative, which aims to mitigate the negative effects of stressful or traumatic experiences on children. She explained that if a child experiences a traumatic event, such as a domestic violence situation, law enforcement would notify the school the next day, asking them to handle the child with care. Ambrosia also mentioned that her team could provide technical assistance and training to communities interested in implementing this initiative. Nicki raised a concern about the availability of child therapists in rural areas, suggesting that many therapists are generally licensed clinical social workers or professional counselors. Ambrosia acknowledged this and emphasized the need for community members to help identify providers that offer grief support services for children.

Community Involvement, Training, and Resource Awareness

Ambrosia discussed the importance of community involvement in supporting children and the need for further training for law enforcement. She mentioned that her team was waiting for approval from the Law Enforcement Training Standards Board to submit an outline and narrative for their training. Ambrosia also emphasized the need for more volunteers to help fill comfort bags for children. Nicki then introduced the October communication campaign and the upcoming December counseling date. She also announced plans for a community survey to measure awareness of available resources and identify potential gaps or barriers in the community. She encouraged everyone to provide input and suggestions for the survey.

Winter Donations and Teen Overdose Concerns

Nicki discussed the need for donations of hats and gloves for the upcoming winter. She suggested potential donation spots such as the HRC, Health Department, and the Life Center. Nicki also proposed reaching out to hotels for potential donations and mentioned a plan to attend the Halls of Madness event on October 12th to collect resources. Jessica expressed concern about recent teen overdoses and the challenges faced in helping minors.

The team decided to coordinate efforts to spread awareness about the counterfeit pill issue in Edgar County among the youth of District 95.

Agency Updates

Individuals provided updates on various agencies, including the Health Department Flue Drive, Neighborhood Watch Services, and HRC. Johnathon mentioned a new funding stream for recovery support services, which could lead to expansion of services. Johnathon also shared plans to start sending a mental health therapist to Kansas schools. Lastly, Lisa mentioned the upcoming CARE Board meeting on October 4th and the subsequent work on the 501(c)(3) project.

Community Outreach Program Growth and Impact

Sue and Vicki discussed the growth and impact of her community outreach program, which includes a soup kitchen. They highlighted the importance of providing not only physical nourishment but also spiritual support, as evidenced by the number of people seeking prayer and the positive changes she's witnessed in the community. Doug also mentioned the program's efforts to combat human trafficking and provide housing for those in need. The conversation ended with an announcement about the relocation of the Celebrate Recovery program to Wednesday nights and the potential for a new NA meeting at Lake Ridge Church on Saturdays.
