MEETING SUMMARY: Southland Recovery Coalition ROSC Council Meeting

The Southland Recovery Coalition ROSC Council Meeting faced challenges due to the absence of the lead and a technical assistant. Participants included representatives from various organizations like Cornerstone, Together We Cope, and NAMI. The meeting emphasized the importance of the community survey, which aims to identify service gaps and demographic needs. The survey, which includes questions on respect for substance users and harm reduction services, has faced some confusion and will be reviewed for next year. The council also discussed asset mapping to enhance service coordination and upcoming events, including a black cultural connection event in March. The meeting concluded with updates on federal grant freezes affecting reimbursements and advocacy efforts. **Angelia** leads introductions and goes around the screen for each person to introduce themselves.

Survey Distribution Outreach & Updates

- Angelia introduced various ways SRC could develop and evaluate strategies to conduct an effective
 community survey to inform the Southland Recovery Council's initiatives moving forward. She noted and
 discussed the importance of the community survey and its impact on identifying service gaps and focusing
 on community needs.
- She went over the survey with attendees and gathered talking points from ROSC Members.
- Angelia mentions the use of incentives like gift cards and token gifts to encourage survey completion.
- Kathy Straniero shared her methods for engaging seniors in the survey process, including bingo and senior lunches.
- Yvonne highlighted the importance of asset mapping and the need for more participation from churches, community service organizations, and individuals with lived experience.





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Key Discussion Points:

- Purpose of the Survey: The survey includes questions on respect for people who use drugs, respect for people with mental illness, and opinions on harm reduction services.
 - Understand community needs and priorities for recovery efforts.
 - o Gather data on economic, social, and environmental concerns.
 - o Foster community engagement and inclusivity.
- May explains the challenges of collecting data within the given timeframe and the need to meet state deliverables.
- Ed Boone raises concerns about the short window for completing the community survey.
- Johanna mentions the possibility of making revisions to the survey questions for next year based on feedback. She also shares the importance of accurate data collection and the need for community input.

Action Items

- Reach out to Johanna Gonzalez offline to discuss potential modifications to the wording of the community survey questions.
- Share the NAMI South Suburbs mental health program flyer with the group.
- Continue aggressive outreach efforts to get community members to complete the ROSC community survey.
- Finalize the asset mapping for the ROSC, focusing on expanding participation from additional sectors. In the next meeting, we must ensure that we highlight the importance of asset mapping and the need for more participation from various sectors to provide comprehensive services.


