# The Office of Sponsored Programs and Research (OSPR)

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The OSPR supports the GovState community by securing external funding in the form of grants and contracts and by facilitating faculty and staff involvement in research, community outreach, student support and other creative activities. OSPR oversees pre-award and post-award externally funded grant and contract activities and coordinates institutional review boards for research with human and animal subjects.

OSPR delivered a strong Fiscal Year 2024, requesting new grant funding in the amount of \$19,998,017 and managing \$28,826,977 in active awards. We also made advances to streamline collaborative research projects by joining the SMART IRB platform, which is funded by the National Institutes of Health (NIH) and designed to facilitate reliance agreements for multisite research. In March 2024, OSPR conducted a survey of faculty research needs. The purpose of the survey was to identify areas where support for faculty research may be improved and to inform the university's future decisions about supporting our research enterprise. Throughout the year, we supported the university community with trainings in proposal development, grant management and ethical research. The following pages provide a detailed account of OSPR accomplishments.

**Illinois Department of Public Health – \$1,000,000**

***Health Equity Checklist for Stroke Awareness Campaign***

The Stroke Education and Awareness Campaign seeks to educate community members across all age groups—children, parents/guardians, young adults, and grandparents—about stroke symptoms and the critical actions to take before, during, and after a stroke. The initiative will be implemented in the Chicago Southland region, covering areas bounded by 159th Street to the North, Harlem Avenue to the West, Hwy 394 to the East, and Crete-Monee Road to the South. The project will also include an environmental scan to assess stroke prevalence, identify certified stroke centers, and gather relevant stroke promotion indicators, which will help guide the campaign’s focus and ensure its effectiveness.

A key objective of the campaign is to develop an engagement strategy that addresses market segmentation, cultural differences, and stroke disparities, using data from the environmental scan to

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tailor the campaign to the diverse needs of the region's communities. The project will also create a comprehensive educational module designed to train stroke promoters in essential competencies, including clinical knowledge of stroke warning signs, treatment options, expected outcomes, and early warning education. The module will target at-risk populations and include strategies for engaging them through social media and other outreach methods. Additionally, messaging will focus on cultural alignment, dispelling myths, and promoting stroke prevention and awareness.

Through strategic community engagement, educational materials, and media outreach, the campaign aims to raise stroke awareness, reduce health disparities, and provide ongoing support for stroke survivors. By prioritizing education and targeted outreach, the campaign will help ensure that community members are better equipped to recognize stroke symptoms and respond effectively, ultimately reducing stroke-related health risks and improving outcomes for survivors.

To date, over 1,000 community members have signed a stroke pledge, committing to take immediate action if they witness a stroke. This initiative reflects the growing community awareness and responsibility to recognize stroke symptoms and respond promptly using the F.A.S.T. method. By engaging the community in this proactive effort, we are fostering an informed and prepared population, ultimately improving the chances of better outcomes for those affected by stroke.

**Illinois Department of Human Services - \$250,000**

***Jaguar LEAP Summer Immersion and First Generation Center Program***

The project aims to serve first- and second-year students (80% of whom identify as racial minorities). Our goals for the project include improving academic skills and success, increasing retention, GPA, and earned-hour ratio, improving the university experience, sense of community, and student thriving, advancing student equity, and engaging faculty and staff in best practices. To achieve these goals, the project will scale up a summer bridge program, Jaguar LEAP, to serve approximately one third of our incoming students, providing academic and social skills vital to college success while earning seven credits hours. In addition, a First-Generation Student Center was created to better serve students whose parents did not earn a bachelor's degree. The office provides programming, support, peer mentoring, tuition assistance, and book scholarships. The office was designed to assist students to navigate college life (e.g. customs, norms, jargon, the "hidden curriculum") to increase retention and persistence rates.

**AmeriCorps - \$29,542**

***FY2024 AmeriCorps VISTA State Continuations***

The VISTA project seeks to grow GovState's Jaguar Jumps program, which serves students with disabilities. It expects to benefit the current Jaguar Jump community and expand the number of participants from 12 to at least 24. Similarly, the project will seek to grow veterans' resources, increase outreach, and provide wrap-around services to our population of 650 veterans. Two VISTA members will contribute to the goals of the project by performing activities such as outreach efforts, building awareness, compiling resource databases, data collection, building community partnerships, and promoting resources and events over the course of five years.

**League of Chicago Theaters in partnership with Com Ed – \$10,000**

***Creating Compassionate Communities Series: Sugar Skull Live: A Dia De Muertos Musical Adventure and Hippet (hip-hop ballet)***

The grant seeks to enhance the Center's capacity to welcome multicultural patrons, break down accessibility barriers, and support companies that bring diverse casts. The award allowed the Center to celebrate cultural traditions, increase bilingual outreach and engagement, and increase accessibility to diversity with the presentation of three live public performances of *Sugar Skull!*, *A Dia de Muertos Musical Adventure* and *Muntu & Deeply Rooted Dance*. One *Sugar Skull!* performance was an Arts in Education school matinee that welcomed fifteen schools, over 50 classrooms, and nearly 900 students from 3rd grade through 22 years of age. Total attendance over three shows and the extra enhancement activities was over three thousand. The partnerships developed with local dance studios for outreach during *Muntu & Deeply Rooted* developed into a future partnership developing a community Nutcracker with Ruth Page and Stage Door dance. This partnership allows South Suburban dancers the opportunity to perform on stage with world-class professional dancers.



## Updates from the Institutional Animal Care and Use Committee

Ethical and humane treatment of animals is paramount in instructional and research endeavors. The GovState Institutional Animal Care and Use Committee (IACUC) oversees and reviews all protocols involving vertebrate animals, conducts inspections of animal facilities and resources, maintains compliance with federal regulations, and develops standard operating procedures and training guidelines.

The IACUC continues overseeing the Monitoring Avian Productivity and Survivorship (MAPS) Project (PI is Diane Gohde). MAPS provides critical, long-term data on population and demographic parameters for over 100 target landbird species at multiple spatial scales. The project is conducted at Governors State University Biological Field Station. The nets are checked frequently and all birds captured are identified, banded, aged, sexed, and released after recording additional demographic and morphometric data. After a brief processing period, all birds are released unharmed. Along with work at the MAPS station, the project involves demonstrations for the students in the Ecology and research courses to promote awareness of the importance of bird banding and conservation efforts.

The IACUC committee is led by Dr. John Yunger. Dr. Yunger is an active researcher and student mentor whose research projects focus on the role of small mammals in *Cryptosporidium* distribution along an urban-rural gradient, heavy metal accumulations by small mammals at abandoned mine sites, and conservation of northern hardwood forests following settlement by Europeans.

In the summer of 2024, Dr. Rebecca Ariel Ober joined the GovState IACUC as a veterinarian. Dr. Ober is a board-certified laboratory animal veterinarian who currently serves as the Senior Clinical Veterinarian at Northwestern University. Dr. Ober graduated from Kansas State College of Veterinary Medicine in 2017 with a Doctor of Veterinary Medicine and a Master of Science in Biomedical Science.

## Updates from the Institutional Review Board |

In the fiscal year 2024, the IRB processed eighty-seven submissions, including seventy-six (87%) initial applications for new studies, ten (12%) modifications to previously approved research, and one closure report. By review type, the IRB received sixty-four (84%) initial applications seeking exempt determinations and twelve (16%) applications for expedited review. Thirty-two (42%) initial applications were received from the College of Education and Human Development; twenty-one (28%) initial applications were submitted by faculty and students in the College of Health and Human Services; nine (12%) initial applications were received from the College of Arts and Sciences; and nine (12%) initial applications were received from the College of Business. Additionally, five (6%) applications were submitted by administrative units. Thirty-eight (50%) new studies were initiated by students or involved students as research assistants.

In support of student research, the IRB continued to conduct guest lectures and presentations for master's and doctoral students pursuing degrees in occupational therapy, physical therapy, and counselor education and supervision, and other programs. As part of its ongoing education effort for faculty researchers, IRB members delivered a presentation on the ethical concerns about using Generative AI in research. The presentation took place during the campus-wide AI Summit in March of 2024.

GovState IRB recently joined **SMART IRB**, the national IRB reliance initiative. SMART IRB is a platform designed to facilitate reliance agreements for multisite research. SMART IRB provides a roadmap for institutions to implement the NIH Single IRB Review policy that went into effect on January 25, 2018. GovState used SMART IRB to complete the reliance process for the NIH-funded *All of Us* sub-award (PI Cathy Baltazar). As part of *All of Us*, GovState is responsible for participant recruitment through community outreach.

Additionally, GovState faculty can now access the ***All of Us Research Hub***, which is maintained by the Vanderbilt University Medical Center (VUMC) and funded by the NIH. Faculty may register for Researcher Workbench access by creating an account at (<https://workbench.researchallofus.org/login>). Registrants will receive an email with further instructions to complete their researcher profiles.

We continue to partner with **CIRTI**fication Training for Community Research Partners, a free human research protection training program for community members participating in community-academic research collaborations. The program is available in English, Spanish, and Haitian Creole. We are excited to offer our community partners this training. The IRB, OSPR, and the College of Education and Human Development (CEHD) continue offering **SONA Systems** software to facilitate the recruitment of student participants for lab and online studies. 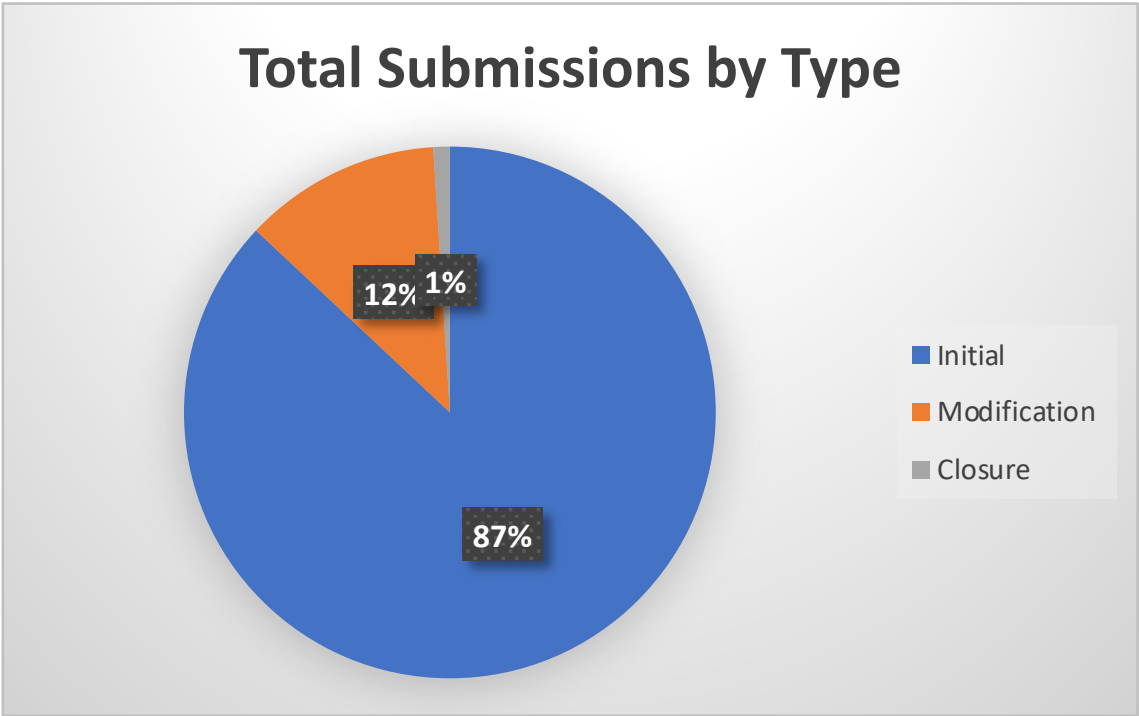

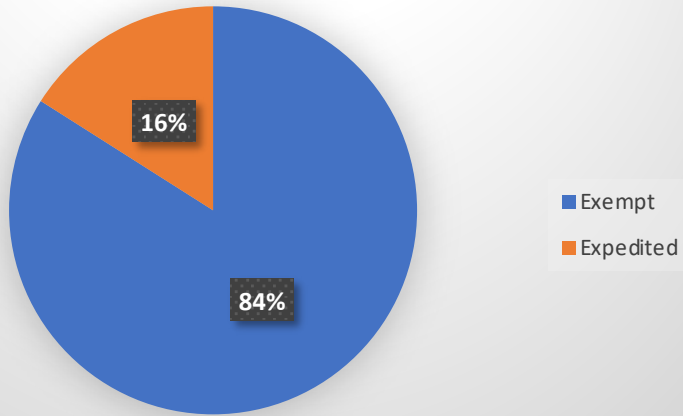

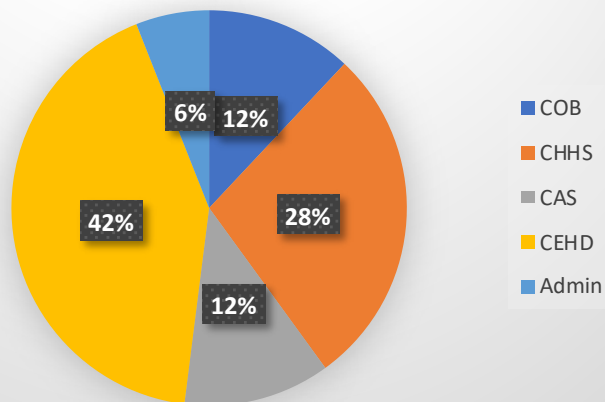

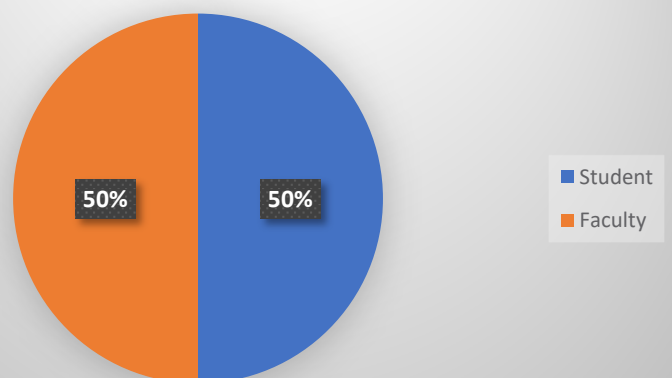
### Initial Submissions by Review Type

## Featured Human Subjects Research |

Generative AI has the potential to transform higher education by streamlining administrative processes and enhancing teaching and learning. In this section, we will highlight the contributions of GovState researchers to the growing body of scholarly literature that examines the opportunities and challenges associated with the use of AI in education.

### **IRB-FY2024-53 - Emerging Classroom Practices from Professors new to AI**

**College of Arts and Sciences**

AI is rapidly becoming a part of everyone's lives. Many universities now have AI policies and syllabus statements in place, so university faculty need to learn that AI can be a tool in their classrooms and profession rather than a problem. Our goal is to present a workshop on AI that maps AI practices, capabilities, and resources for teaching and learning to encourage a few faculty to explore how AI can enhance their practice. Then, we can share these experiences with others in academia who aren't sure of how to get started. Finally, we are excited to explore the layers involved with using AI to teach faculty about AI, which will hopefully help them navigate their students' use of AI.

### **IRB-FY2024-100 - Artificial Intelligence in Education**

**Praggyan Mohanty**

**College of Business**

The main objective of the study is to understand the effects of using AI tools in a classroom setting. What types of tasks benefit from using AI tools, and which do not experience an improvement? How does using AI tools affect student learning experience? The study will evaluate student experience using AI tools such as ChatGPT. Many technological tools involve a learning curve. Therefore, it would be informative to investigate where the students can provide the proper prompts for the desired outputs and how those prompts affect the information provided by the tool. Further, the study will examine the process of integrating information obtained from the AI tool to complete the task at hand effectively.

### **IRB-FY2024-98 - Navigating the Landscape: Artificial Intelligence in Higher Education**

**College of Education**

The study aims to explore AI as a digital coaching tool across various programmatic offerings. Student work samples will be used for an autoethnographic research study on the utilization of Artificial Intelligence in higher education. By incorporating AI elements into our curriculum and collecting student work samples from upcoming semesters, we will learn about the application of AI in educational settings. This practical application of theoretical knowledge will enhance students' learning experiences and provide valuable data for analysis. Our interdisciplinary approach will foster collaboration and exploration, contributing to the collective knowledge and innovation in AI education. Ultimately, our efforts will bridge theory and practice, inform instructional design decisions, and propel the field of AI in higher education forward.

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## Featured Human Subjects Research (cont.)

### **IRB-FY2024-84 - Using New Technology for Teaching and Learning: A Workshop Preparation Project & IRB-FY2024-106 - Evolving an Experiential Learning Environment** **Robert Garcia and Erica Ceka, College of Arts and Sciences**

Students enrolled in BAN 8900 and PADM 6700 courses were tasked with utilizing a range of innovative technological and analytical tools to complete their course assignments. Some assignments required collecting data from publicly available sources for business analytics and manipulating data available in diverse formats to support analysis. Throughout the process, students received support from the GSU library staff to ensure a successful data-collection experience. Dr. Garcia and Dr. Ceka used de-identified student coursework as an example of how innovative technology and tools, including artificial intelligence (AI), can be used in data analytics courses to enhance teaching and learning.

- **Training**—Projects involving the training of students/ scholars in a special manner or for a specific purpose that is approved by the funding agency.
- **Curriculum Development**—Projects involving the creation or substantial revision of courses or programs that are research-based.
- **Public Service**—Projects involving research or instructional activities that benefit the institution or community.
- **Fellowships**—Support for an individual's own scholarly pursuits.

Governors State University subscribes to several searchable online databases that can help you find funding opportunities to suit your interests as well as useful information to enhance your proposal.

**GrantForward** offers an extensive database of funding opportunities, which are gathered from over 9,000 federal, state and private sponsors. However, GrantForward allows you to do more than just search for grants. With a researcher profile, you can receive grant recommendations related to your field and research interests. GrantForward uses your research interests, publications, and other profile information to recommend the best-fitting grant opportunities to you.
